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A SPECIAL FOREWORD

We regret the lateness of this Fact Book and its incompleteness. For the first time computer work was done on a new computer requiring the translation of all programs to the new hardware. Perhaps inevitably, this has encountered unforeseen problems and delays. At this writing the problems are not yet fully resolved. Consequently this edition is not complete.

All enrollment data tables are the product of computerization, as will be apparent from the type face in the appendices. All other information comes from hand tabulations and calculations. Every effort was made to maintain accuracy, but these do not have the computer's verification.

Computer work will continue. Once the problems are solved, all of the usual tables will be available. And the Association will supply them to all ATS member schools and, on request, to others who may have purchased an early edition of the book.

INTRODUCTION

These Fact Books on Theological Education have been published since 1969-70. Data are derived from the Annual Report forms which each Association member school supplies every Fall. Thus, this edition relies on the Fall 1978 reports for student information, 1978-79 salary scales, and the audited financial data from the 1977-78 fiscal year. Per student data for revenue and expenditures thus use enrollment statistics from Fall 1977. These were published in the 1977-78 Fact Book and may also be found in Table A.

To facilitate comparisons the format of the successive Fact Books has remained relatively constant. Certain regional tables have been omitted, for economy of printing, but those data are available in the Association's offices on request.

Sex/race/minority data are reported in more detail this year than has been possible previously. Information about women, blacks, Hispanics, and Pacific/Asian Americans was submitted to computerization for the first time. Hence the enrollment tables in the appendices have been expanded to reflect this additional information. Data for last year's graduates in each category are also reported.

Full-time equivalency student data are also printed in the appendices (see C-6, D-6, E-6). For the first time it appears that there can be confidence in their accuracy. Next year it will be possible to use these data with 1978-79 revenue/expenditure information and provide cost per student reports both on a head count and FTE basis. It is possible that some preliminary information of this kind may be available this year, especially to denominational groups of member schools.

Table A lists all member schools and identifies the basis for the classifications of each in the appendices. Table B provides enrollment data at four-year intervals since 1956.

Certain arbitrary definitions have been necessary with respect to these classifications. For example, a seminary is classified as a part of a university only if the larger institution possesses at least two other professional schools or departments. Schools are classified as related to a cluster only if the relationship includes at least two other seminaries. Denominational groups of schools are sorted and reported publicly -- in the Fact Book -- only if the denomination maintains at least four institutions which are members of the Association. Because the computer cannot accommodate dual denominational relationships of some schools, each has been classified on the basis of the primary student body relationship. Thus, Louisville Presbyterian is included in the United Presbyterian category, Andover Newton in the United Church of Christ, and Trinity Lutheran in the American Lutheran group. Neither Bexley Hall nor Berkeley Divinity School, Episcopal seminaries, are included in the Protestant Episcopal data because of their relationships with Colgate Rochester and the Yale Divinity School respectively.

The text has been prepared to report and emphasize the most important data. Factual description is the purpose. No value judgments about size of school, mode of financing, patterns of expenditure, or other matters are intended. Each reader is invited to make his/her own judgments on these matters in the light of the data presented in reference to his/her own perspectives on theological education.

As in the past, all salary scales have been edited to preserve confidentiality. Hence any category with less than three persons has been eliminated.

ENROLLMENT

The growth trend in theological school enrollments experienced in recent years leveled off in 1978. The increase in students registered was only +2.7%, the smallest since 1972 when the growth was just +0.7%. In 1975 enrollment rose +11.0%; in 1976 it was +5.2%, followed by +5.1% in 1977. Thus the decline in growth reported by other segments of higher education in previous years finally reached seminaries in 1978. Nonetheless it should be noted that Association member institutions registered +55.8% more persons in 1978 than was the situation in 1969, when the first Fact Book was published. However, this is somewhat misleading, since there has been an increase of +13.5% in the number of institutions reporting. In that nine-year period the average student body has increased from 175 to 241 persons. Table 1 provides data on this changing situation.

Table 1 also reveals another characteristic of this growth, the contrasting relationship of professional and graduate programs. Since 1969 professional degree registrants have increased +65.0%. But in that same period graduate programs (those which usually prescribe the Master of Divinity as a prerequisite) have actually lost -5.5% in enrollment. The full details of these changes are analyzed in subsequent sections.

Table 2 provides more precise information for 1977 and 1978, since the data are confined to the same institutions reporting in both years. The Association received three new member institutions last year, but two existing schools merged to form a new institution. The 1978 data for the three new schools are eliminated from Table 2. When this adjustment is made, the net increase is actually reduced to +1.6%, or only 745 additional registrants.

Curiously enough, in 1978 graduate enrollment actually increased +2.6%, somewhat counter to the trend across the years since 1969.

Table C-1 in the appendices provides full details on the distribution of these 46,460 persons across the several degree programs offered by theological seminaries. Table C-6 reveals that the "full-time equivalency" number of students was 36,219 which indicates that the average student was registered for 78.0% of a full-time program. This does vary substantially among the several degrees. For example, M.Div. registrants averaged 88.3% loads; in-ministry D.Min. candidates only 37.3% of full-time study. Similar comparisons can be found for all students in Tables C-1 and C-6 respectively. Tables D-1 and D-6 provide the parallel data for the several denominational families of institutions, and E-1 and E-6 for regional groupings.

Professional Degree Enrollments

Table 3 reports data regarding the various professional degree programs since 1969. The most obvious change since that earlier year is in D.Min.

enrollment, up from 201 persons (who then comprised less than one percent of professional enrollees) to 4,833 persons in 1978, only nine years later. The next paragraph and Table 4 will provide further data and analysis of this phenomenon. The second largest change is the two-year masters degree. Religious education is quite popular as are the M.A., M.A.R., and M.T.S. degrees. None of these lead to ordination, although some graduates of the two-year programs are thereby prepared for careers full time in church education, music, social work, counseling and other professional fields. Since 1969 enrollment in these

degree programs has risen +149.4%. Even nondegree students in regular courses have grown dramatically from 2,136 persons in 1969 to 4,623 last Fall. Only the B.D./M.Div. languishes, up only +29.1% in nine years, about one-half the total growth in seminary enrollment. Thus, it would be quite inaccurate to assume that the substantial growth in seminary registrants since 1969 automatically reflects a similar increase in potential ordinands. In fact, while total enrollment has increased +55.8%, ordinands have risen only +29.9%, including both B.D./M.Div. and in-sequence D.Min. students.

Table 4 provides more precise data on the D.Min. phenomenon. It began initially in the mid-1960's as a four-year substitute for the B.D. or M.Div.

But other schools offered an in-ministry D.Min. to clergy with years of ordained experience. ATS has collected separate data only since 1975. Despite the large annual growth in D.Min. students, Table 4 indicates that the in-sequence track is steadily declining in both institutions and registrants. Thus the occasionally voiced apprehension that the D.Min. may replace the M.Div. is simply not supported by these data. The M.Div. continues to be the basic ordination degree, required by most denominations, and it is the overwhelming choice of students preparing for such careers.

Graduate Degree Enrollments

The Association classifies as graduate those degree programs which take four or five (or more) years to complete and usually (but not always) require the M.Div. as a prerequisite. Only the D.Min. is an exception, classified as "professional." Table 5 reports these data. It is obvious that there has been a gradual shift away from the Th.D. and S.T.D. degrees toward the Ph.D. But all doctoral degrees combined reached their highest totals in 1976 when 2,213 persons were registered. The total dropped to 2,065 in 1977 (down -6.7%), and

further to 2,027 in 1978 (down -1.8%). However, despite these doctoral decreases, graduate masters degrees rose from 1,492 last year to 1,624 in 1978 (up +8.8%), providing a modest overall graduate degree increase of +2.6%.

Sex Distribution of Theological Students

The Association has been collecting these data since 1972, and full computer analysis is available in Tables C-3, D-3, and E-3 in this and previous Fact Books. F-3, G-3, and H-3 are parallel in reporting women graduates.

Table 6 in the text provides a summary of these data. Women still represent only a very modest proportion of total enrollment in seminaries (19.3%). However this is a very substantial improvement over 1972 when the number was 3,358 persons and 10.2% of all students. The import of this change is indicated by the fact that the number of women in schools of theology has risen +167.2% since 1972; men enrollees have increased only +26.3% in the same time span. Thus the rate of increase is more than six times greater for women. Almost half of the increase in enrollment in 1978 was women; i.e., 601 of 1,238 additional students.

Table 6 also presents data in the several broad degree registration categories. Women continue to be represented by the highest percentage in the two-year M.A., M.A.R., M.R.E., and M.T.S. degrees which may lead to church vocations but not ordination. But the greatest number of women is found in the M.Div. and D.Min. degrees related to ordained ministry. Since 1972 the women enrolled in these programs have risen +269.6%, an increase more than ten times faster than male registrants. This year they constitute 13.9% of all M.Div. students and 5.3% of D.Min. candidates. More precise data for each specific degree are available in Tables C-3, D-3, and E-3.

The post-M.Div. graduate programs continue to attract larger numbers of women, as Table 6 reveals. The proportion of women in these programs (18.8%) is almost equal to that of all programs (19.3%). Enrollment in post-M.Div.

masters degrees rose to 328 persons (20.2% of the total). Doctoral registrants (S.T.D., Th.D., Ph.D.) numbered 357 in 1978, down slightly from the previous year. However in the two years since 1976 women doctoral students increased +4.7%, while male doctoral candidates decreased -10.8%. Thus, despite the fact that total doctoral enrollment is drifting downward, the presence of women continues to rise.

Table 6 provides information on enrollment across the years. Table 7 reports on graduates. It will be immediately evident that the decline in graduates reported last year was atypical. The increases noted since 1972-73 resumed this past year and reached their highest levels since statistics have been received. Both graduate masters and academic doctorates were awarded in 1977-78 to more women recipients than any previous year. When the proportion of women graduates is compared with entering classes in previous years, it indicates that there is no sex difference in degree completion data. Women who seek post-M.Div. education are just as likely to be successful and receive the degrees as are men. Thus the pool of women scholars available for teaching positions continues to grow.

Black Student Enrollment

The Association has collected data on black student enrollment since 1970, and Table 8 presents that information for each successive year. The

progress is slow, and the rate varies from year to year. Despite the fact that black students have increased +137.5% in eight years, the proportion of total enrollment which they represent rose only from 2.6% to 4.1%. Starting from such a small number even this very substantial increase still leaves blacks greatly under represented when compared with the population at large. Distributions by degree program are found in Tables C-2, D-2, and E-2.

Black students are distributed rather unevenly across the Association's member schools. From 1970 to 1975 the proportion of blacks enrolled in the five primarily black institutions steadily diminished from 32.7% down to 25.6%, but beginning in 1976 this trend was reversed. In 1978 the five black institutions enrolled 28.7% of these students (551 persons, up from 264 in 1970). The largest number of black students is found in the twenty-one interdenominational or nondenominational schools (719 persons). The twelve United Methodist seminaries follow with 276 enrolled and United Presbyterian reporting 130. Other denominational groupings have substantially fewer black students, and the changes from year to year are modest in size. Table D-2 in successive Fact Books provides full details.

Table 9 reports sex/degree distribution data for black students in selected years since 1972. It will be immediately apparent that the increase in all

women students noted above is paralleled by black women. Although the percentages are uniformly lower, the rate of increase in black female enrollment is very similar. This is evident in each of the several broad degree categories.

It was noted above and in Table 8 that black students represent 4.1% of all theological students. However this is a total figure, and the percentages for individual degree programs vary somewhat. For example, the two-year degree category is 3.6%; the three- and four-year ordination degrees are 4.3%; but the D.Min. is lower at 3.4%. The variation from the average is somewhat less favorable in the post-M.Div. graduate category. Blacks in masters degrees are only 1.2% of the total, and but 3.3% in academic doctorates. And both of those percentages have been dropping in recent years. In 1974 masters programs included 1.7% black students and 3.8% in academic doctorates. Thus black persons tend to be enrolled somewhat disproportionately in the lower degree programs and also in the special and unclassified (nondegree) category. They are not as fully represented in graduate degree study.

The above observations are at least partially reflected in data on black graduates found in Table 10.

While the post-M.Div. masters graduates equalled the previous high during 1977-78, academic doctoral graduates numbered only nine persons. In both instances these figures were substantially greater than the earlier two years. However the declining black enrollments seem to suggest that these data may not be sustained. Black masters students have diminished -64.9% since 1972, and doctoral students -15.2% since 1974. Thus, all of the increase in black enrollment has been in the several first professional degree programs, with fewer graduates with those credentials seeking graduate education.

Hispanic/American Enrollment

The Association has collected this information since 1972, and Table 11 provides summary data. Tables C-4, D-4, and E-4 for the first time publish distributions of the Hispanic/American students in the several categories used in the appendices. Graduation data are included in Tables F-4, G-4, and H-4. Each year since 1972 there has been a slight increase in Hispanic enrollment, from 264 persons to 681 in 1978 (up +158.0%). The number of Hispanic women is quite small, and the proportion is well below the ratio for all women enrollees. Total Hispanic enrollment constitutes only 1.5% of all students, far below the percentage represented in the total population. Graduate students are even more underrepresented at 0.9% of that category. Full details are available in Table 11.

Pacific/Asian American Enrollment

Table 12 provides data for Pacific/Asian American students. This information has been collected only for two years, and both are summarized in Table 12. Persons included in this category are "students from Asian and Pacific Island ancestry, whether born abroad or in the U.S.A. and its trust territories in the Pacific Ocean." There was very little increase this year, only from 494 to 499 persons. And there was an absolute decrease in enrollment in professional programs with ten fewer students reported. However graduate degree enrollment rose by fifteen in contrast to the trends with

other groups. Furthermore Pacific/Asian students in graduate programs constitute 14.8% of their group, in marked contrast to 7.9% for all students; 7.6% for women; 4.5% for blacks; and 4.7% for Hispanics. Thus as a group Pacific and Asian American students are more likely to pursue graduate degrees.

In 1978 they represented only 1.1% of total enrollment, 1.9% of graduate enrollment, and received 2.3% of the academic doctorates which were awarded. Other details are available in the appendices, Tables C-5, D-5, and E-5, with 1977-78 graduate data in F-5, G-5, and H-5.

Regional Enrollment Changes

The Association of Theological Schools is international in membership having had both Canadian and United States institutions in its membership from the beginning. In 1978 the Canadian member theological schools were twenty-two in number or 11.4% of the institutional membership enrolling 4.9% of the student population. With the exception of the D.Min. degree, which has not been widely adopted in Canada, the same professional and graduate degree programs are offered by schools in both countries. But there are some interesting contrasts across the two nations. While Canadian students as a whole constitute only 4.9% of the total registrants in both countries, they are 8.3% of

the post-M.Div. candidates in all institutions. Thus it would appear that Canadian students are almost twice as likely to seek graduate education as is the case in the States. This generalization may be somewhat imprecise, since students from each nation are found studying in the other as well as at home. Table 13 provides comparative data for each year since 1972. It is obvious that growth in enrollment is more pronounced in Canada than in the United States. In only one year (1976) did the U.S. growth statistics exceed Canada in rate of growth. In fact, in several years the rate was double or even triple the U.S. increase. These and other comparisons for individual degree enrollments can be made by examining Table E or E-1 in successive issues of this publication. Similar information about graduates can be found in Tables H and H-1.

Changes in Professional Enrollments in Denominational Schools

Table D-1 provides details of enrollment in specific degree programs for the denominational groups of theological schools. Reference should also be made to Table 3 in the text above which presents this information about the several degrees in summary totals. There it was observed that the increase in two-year degree enrollments (M.A., M.A.R., M.T.S., M.R.E.) and the D.Min. was much more rapid than the basic ordination degree, the M.Div. Table D-1 confirms this general conclusion for most church groups of institutions. For example, between 1972 and 1978 the contrasting growth in M.Div. and D.Min. students was as follows: American Baptist, +21.2% and +380%; United Methodist, +3.5% and +206.4%; United Presbyterian, +8.1% and +378.1%; and United Church of Christ, +17.0% and +21.2%. In contrast, Southern Baptist seminaries registered a +61.8% increase in M.Div. enrollees while also receiving +174.6% more D.Min. students. Roman Catholic institutions in the United States actually experienced a -20.7% decrease in M.Div. students during these six years. United Church of Canada reported a +180.4% growth in M.Div. registrants in the same period, but Canadian Roman Catholic schools lost -13.2% M.Div. candidates in those years. Thus, it is evident that the overall generalizations about the professional degrees are not universally applicable. There are distinct and noteworthy exceptions.

Table D-1 reveals one other difference. It was noted earlier that eighty-one different seminaries shared 4,833 D.Min. students among them, but this distribution is by no means even. The six United Presbyterian theological schools register 28.5% (1,377 persons) of the total; United Methodist schools 12.9% (622 persons); Southern Baptist 10.5% (508 persons); United Church of Christ 7.7% (371 persons); and Presbyterian U.S. 7.5% (360 persons). 9.1% (441) are enrolled in the inter- or nondenominational institutions. Similar observations could be made about the two-year degrees, especially in reference to the six Southern Baptist institutions which collectively register 35.2%

(2,315 persons) of all candidates for these degrees. This is especially true for the M.R.E. degree where 61.5% of all religious education students are found in these six institutions.

Changes in Numbers of Graduates

Table 14 provides data on the numbers of professional degrees awarded in successive years. Full details are available in tables F-1, G-1, and H-1, and parallel tables for blacks, women, Hispanics, and Asian Americans are also included in the appendices. The most startling growth noted this year is in M.Div. graduates. The increased enrollment reported three and four years ago has now reached graduation. 13.2% more ordination candidates (742 persons) were available to the churches in 1977-78 than the previous year. The number

of two-year degree graduates also continues to grow. Only the D.Min. graduation rate appears to have leveled off, perhaps reflecting the much reduced growth rate of D.Min. registrations in the last two or three years.

Table 15 continues these data for graduates receiving doctoral degrees. Religious education doctorates are received at about the same rate, annually, with nineteen reported during the past year. S.T.D./Th.D. awards have

remained fairly constant across the past four years, reflecting the enrollment plateau noted earlier. The number of Ph.D. degrees conferred continues to fluctuate considerably. Last year it was up +31.0%, after having dropped -29.3% the previous academic year. The long term trend since 1970 has clearly been upward, but the data for any particular future year would be difficult to predict. This is probably explained by the uncertain length of academic doctoral programs from initial registration to dissertation completion and receipt of the doctor of philosophy degree.

Denominational Membership of Black Students

Fact Books from the beginning in 1969-70 have always reported the denominational membership of all students. However these data have been confined to the church bodies which sponsor Association member schools. Others have simply been listed as "other denominations" in Tables I, J, L, and M. Furthermore, no denominational distribution of students has been collected by sex or racial identity. This year, responding to specific requests regarding the 1,919 black students, a special form was provided. And the denominational membership of these students was solicited. The distribution of membership is as follows:

NUMBER AND DISTRIBUTION OF PERSONNEL

Tables O through V have customarily provided information on the distribution of personnel in the categories of administration, faculty, and library staff. This year because of computer problems these tables are fewer in number, although it is expected that they ultimately can be supplied to all purchasers of this volume. At this writing they are confined to size and status distributions for administrators and the same for faculty. Faculty distribution by denominational groups of schools is also available.

Table 16 provides employment data for full-time staff (with the exception of library staff for 1978-79 which have not been tabulated at this writing). Once again the number of reporting institutions has risen to 193. However the most remarkable change is the increase in administrative personnel, up forty-four persons or an increase of +3.7% per member institution. This is almost double the very slight rise in student population. The number of full-time faculty rose by twenty persons, although actually decreasing slightly per school due to the net gain of two member schools of theology.

Table 17 provides a more precise analysis of the role that part-time instructional personnel play in seminary teaching. Across the years both the numbers of such instructors and the percentage of total teaching which they

supply has been growing. In 1971 it represented only 15.7% of instruction. In 1976 this had risen to 20.0%, and it continues to rise slightly. This year 2,229 persons collectively served to provide 20.9% of instruction.

Sex and Race Distribution of Administrative and Faculty Personnel

Tables 18 and 19 report the changing picture for employment of women in administrative and faculty positions for the years since 1971 when sex data were requested for the first time. It is apparent that there has been slow but

gradual improvement across the years. Absolute numbers of women administrators rose from 103 in 1971 to 167 in Fall 1978, a 62.1% increase. However this still constitutes only 16.9% of all administrative personnel. It should also be noted

that the 819 males are down slightly from the 823 reported in 1975. Since that date women have increased in administrative ranks by forty persons, or 31.5%. Thus, while the growth is modest, it is present year after year.

The situation with respect to women faculty is somewhat more favorable. Fall 1978 saw 170 women employed full time in schools of theology, up +132.9%

since 1971. They still constitute only 7.1% of the total instructional staff, but that proportion has risen from 3.2% just seven years ago. It has been noted earlier that the pool of women scholars with academic doctoral degrees is increasing steadily. The data for women employed part-time are also reported in Table 19. Note the contrast between part-time and full-time employment for women and men. While there are 77.1% more women teaching part-time, there are actually fewer men offering instruction on a limited basis. It seems obvious that institutions are attempting to compensate on a part-time basis for the very low employment of women full time.

Table 20 presents this information in greater detail, providing precise numbers of women in each administrative post and every faculty rank. There continues to be only one woman serving as a chief administrative officer, and she

has announced her resignation and will be replaced by a man. Academic deans increased from one to four persons, but women deans of students declined by two. Registrars (who constitute forty percent of all women administrators) increased slightly, as did business officers, directors of public relations, and women in other unspecified posts. Women development directors declined from six to four. Overall women are now 16.9% of seminary administrators, up from 11.5% in 1974-75.

Table 20 also describes the place of women in theological faculties. In 1971-72 there were only 26 women in the traditionally tenured ranks of full and associate professor. By 1978-79 this had risen to 70 persons. Despite this substantial rise, they are still only 3.9% of tenured faculty. The nontenured posts of assistant professor and instructor held 47 women in 1971-72. This has become 100 this year, or 16.3% of the total. The 7.1% figure for full-time women faculty lags far behind the rest of higher education.

Table 21 provides information about the employment of blacks in administrative and faculty positions for the past four years. Each year there is modest overall improvement. In 1971 there were twenty-one black administrative personnel. In seven years this has risen to thirty-two persons, still only 3.2% of all administrators. The changes in specific positions tend to be both up and down, one or two persons per year. Exactly half of these administrators--sixteen--are in the five primarily black institutions.

The situation with respect to black faculty is only very slightly better. In 1971 there were only thirty-two blacks in the tenured ranks of full or associate professor. This has risen to forty-eight in 1978-79 data (thirty of whom teach in the five black schools). Assistant and instructor ranks have risen from twenty to thirty-two in the same seven-year span (and fifteen of these are in the black schools). Thus forty-five of the eighty full-time black faculty are in these five primarily black institutions leaving just thirty-five among the other 188 primarily white schools.

Overall black instructional involvement did increase this year. The eighty full-time teachers (the highest ever) were joined by ninety-six part-time persons (also a record). Collectively they represent 3.8% of all teaching personnel.

COMPENSATION

The complete details on compensation can be found in Tables NN-VV in the appendices. Total compensation for each employment position is provided. This includes (1) actual cash salary; (2) housing allowance--if any; (3) additional benefits, such as insurance, medical, etc.; and (4) institutional contribution to pension. Administrative and library salaries are usually twelve-month contracts. Faculty salaries ordinarily include benefits on an annual basis but cover only academic year duties, even though for convenience the salary is often paid in twelve monthly payments. Additional payments for such duties as summer teaching are not included.

This initial edition of the Fact Book does not include the usual wide range of data, since computer tabulations were not available. This information, including all regular tables, will be prepared later and supplied to all purchasers of the volume. In the interim persons interested in the distribution of total compensation among cash, housing, added benefits, and pension should consult earlier Fact Books where such proportions are described in detail. There is no reason to expect that these earlier ratios will have been materially altered this year.

It should be noted that dollar comparisons from year to year are quite misleading, since they do not reflect the impact of inflation. Consequently these sums have been reduced to percentages of change where comparisons with the rise in the cost of living can be readily made. The Consumer Price Index change, reflecting actual purchasing power rose 7.7% between July 1, 1977, and June 30, 1978. The following tables reflect these data.

Administrative Compensation

Table 22 reports the compensation situation for each of the administrative posts for the past five years. In accredited institutions the average

increase exceeded the C.P.I. in only one of these years, 1976-77. This year there was a net loss in averages of -1.5%. Three accredited school positions (Dean of Students, development, and public relations directors) did better the 7.7% experienced in inflation. All other positions fell below it. In associate schools two

positions (academic dean and business officer) showed remarkable gains. Since the sample includes only a few persons, this may be more apparent than real. The average for all associate institution administrators was even worse, with a -2.7% net loss. Full details will ultimately be available in Tables NN, OO, and PP.

Faculty Compensation

Summary details for faculty salaries are contained in Tables 23-28. Comparisons are made with each of the preceding five years. This is total compensation (cash, housing, additional benefits, pension) as noted earlier. Tables 23-25 report accredited schools; Tables 26-28 associate institutions. Tables 23 and 26 present dollar amounts; Tables 24 and 27 report percentage of dollar increase; Tables 25 and 28 reflect net change in real purchasing power. The average dollar increase in accredited schools was \$1,440 this year or +6.3% increase. This is up slightly from \$1,297 the previous year. Nonetheless it fell 1.4% below the rise in the C.P.I. increase of 7.7%. An average increase of \$1,763 would have been required just to stand still in relation to costs. The results for the four faculty ranks vary somewhat, but none matched the increased inflation. Full professor (70% of accredited school faculty hold this rank) came the closest with a +7.2% average increase. Instructors were least favored, with only +2.7% gain, or a full 5.0% net loss in the war with inflation.

Table 25 provides the five-year data with respect to cost of living. In only one of these, 1976-77 when the C.P.I. rose but 5.5%, was the impact of inflation bettered.

Tables 26-28 report the parallel data for associate member schools. Their overall average was slightly better (7.3% as compared with 6.3%) than accredited schools. But here the results are substantially more volatile. For example, this year associate professors have a higher average salary (\$21,417) than full professors (\$20,131), a phenomenon which has occurred only one time earlier

(1974-75). It results from the fact that associate institutions with the higher salary patterns happen to have few full professors and larger numbers of associates. However, despite the fact that both associate and instructor show remarkable increases, there are relatively few persons at those ranks. And the overall average is lower than the C.P.I. increase.

A check of Tables 25 and 28 for cumulative results is revealing. Since 1974 accredited school faculty have lost a total of -8.3% to the battle against inflation, while associate school faculty have had even poorer results, a -12.8% loss across the years. All of higher education suffers from this plight, and it is obvious that theological school faculty are no exception.

Full details on faculty salaries are available in Tables QQ, RR, and SS. RR provides the information for the several denominational families of schools which are regularly published.

FINANCES-REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

Tables AA-MM provide the overall financial data for association member schools. The customary categories of data are reported, with summaries following in the text.

Table 29 lists revenue/expenditure information across the years that Fact Books have been published. It is readily apparent there that gradual improvement is the most obvious comment which can be made. The surplus/deficit situation was corrected in 1975-76 and each succeeding years brings slightly better results. However, lest the \$3,595,000 figure be misleading, please note that it represents only \$18,921 per school, hardly a significant sum. Improvement does continue, but the surplus is only 1.7% of the average seminary budget. Thus even the slightest change in the revenue picture could reverse this situation.

Table 30 provides even more precise information. The revenue/expenditure situation with respect to educational and general items continues to exhibit a surplus. It is in fact a growing surplus having risen from only +\$82 per student in 1973-74 to +\$242 last year. Student aid results were slightly better this year, but this remains the major problem. Schools of theology find it necessary to award far more financial aid to seminarians than they receive designated for this specific purpose. And the operation of auxiliary enterprises (housing, food service, etc.) continue to operate at a deficit. This year it rose to \$46 per student enrolled.

There is another way to view these statistics. In 1968-69 the average amount received by each member school was \$562,265. In 1977-78 this had risen to \$1,135,721, up +102.0%. Expenditures increased from \$572,618 to \$1,116,800,

an increase of +95.0%. The C.P.I. increase in that same period was 78.4%.

Sources of Revenue

Tables AA-EE in the appendices provide detailed data on revenue sources and amounts. The principal sources for accredited schools are gifts/grants (42%) and tuition (29%). Endowment income lags well behind these two at 19%. Their proportions are not significantly altered when Roman Catholic data are excluded (Table BB). Associate member (unaccredited) schools have slightly different patterns. Non-Catholic associate schools receive only 22% by tuition, 13% from endowment, but these are compensated for by 61% in the gifts/grants category.

An examination of the various sub-groups reveals wide variations in these averages. Schools with 300-500 enrollment receive 34% of their educational and general income (\$1,325) from tuition, and this contrasts somewhat markedly with those having fifty or fewer students; i.e., 12% which amounts to \$837 per person. Endowment ranges from 13% (500 and above enrollment) to 22% (151-300 students). Gifts/grants are more stable (from 38% to 47%). Year to year comparisons are remarkably consistent, as may be ascertained by examining Fact Books across several years.

Denominational groupings of institutions reveal even wider variations. Tuition and fees range from a low of \$327 (15%) in Southern Baptist institutions to a high of \$1,914 per student (24%) in Protestant Episcopal seminaries. The highest percentage is 33% (United Methodist), with the lowest at 13% (United Church-Canada). Endowments vary from 9% (\$348) to 45% (\$3,335). Gifts and denominational grants represent 71% in Southern Baptist members, but only 23% in Roman Catholic institutions located in Canada. It must also be noted that total educational and general income also varies greatly among denominational groups of schools. Its range is \$2,129 per student in Southern Baptist institutions to \$8,082 in Protestant Episcopal schools. This information may be examined in detail in Table CC.

Patterns of Expenditure

Tables FF-JJ provide parallel information on expenditures. Variations among various size subgroupings of schools are much less than in revenue categories. Administration costs from 27% to 32% of educational and general expenditures. Instruction ranges from 42% and 51%; library costs from 9% to 12%. The data for all accredited schools are 30%, 45% and 10% respectively, with the balance in operating and maintenance items.

As with revenue denominational groups do exhibit more deviation from these narrow ranges. For example: administration, 21% (United Church of Canada) to 40% (American Baptist); instruction, 37% (Presbyterian Church, U.S.) to 62% (United Church of Canada); and library, 7% (United Canada) to 15% (Disciples of Christ). Total educational and general expenditures exhibit a wide range of per student amounts, \$1,940 to \$8,222. See Table HH for full details.
